

#### A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

#### "Tell the Truth!"

Writing these words in the middle of January, we have just celebrated Martin Luther King Day—both at the Temple and with the wider community at Bristol Community College. I am looking forward to our Tu biShevat Seder near the end of January (weather permitting!), and to our celebration of Purim in March. But February is a "lonely" month this Jewish year, graced by no Jewish holidays (Valentine's Day not being one of ours). Yet, like Martin Luther King Day which belongs not to any one religious community, but to the whole country, the end of February brings a "ritual" which many Jews, along with their Gentile neighbors, look forward to observing. I am talking about the event which this year will take place on Sunday, February 28th: the 88th Academy Awards.

But first, I do want to mention our TBE Martin Luther King, Jr. Shabbat. In addition to taking this as an occasion to sing prayers like *Mi Khamokha* to the tune of "Sing Low Sweet Chariot," and *Adon Olam* to "Go Down Moses," both Shabbat services included the eloquent and powerful words of Dr. King and also of his close colleague Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. On Shabbat morning, after study of the Torah portion, we had an engaging discussion of excerpts from the speeches and/or writings of both Dr. King and Rabbi Heschel. Taken together, their words ably took the place of the Haftarah for that day, for truly they were prophets in their generation.

Now-to return to the subject of "the movies": one reason that Jews have loved watching the Oscars, and reveling in the fun of the world of the cinema, is that since film's inception, we have been such an overly-represented part of that world, whether as actors, directors, producers, screenwriters, or composers of film scores. American films in particular have excelled in championing the underdog, addressing injustices and celebrating heroes who dare to challenge the status quo. And because we have been so much part and parcel of the film business, we have not been shy about depicting our own culture on the screen. On Sunday, January 17th, about 17 of us gathered at the Temple to watch "Crossing Delancey." It was a joy to watch such a very Jewish film in a room full of Jews; we delighted in its scenes of the Lower East Side, with its Judaica and pickle stores. We laughed together when the heroine's parents called her from Florida on her birthday—so that her father and his barbershop quartet of friends could sing her "Happy Birthday" in fourpart harmony over the phone! In the middle of a scene of near-seduction by a handsome but manipulative novelist. we all yelled at the heroine together "get out of there!" We

would have been furious with her if she missed her date with "Sam the pickle man."

Film, like theater (and worship) can bring us together. But the "ritual" that so many of us observe on the night of the "Oscars" is spoiled for me this year. For the second year in a row, no actors of color have been nominated for any of the Academy Awards for acting. Last year it was Selma's star David Oyelowo (so powerfully depicting Martin Luther King) who was flagrantly snubbed, and this year guite a number of great African-American actors. I will only speak, however, of the one whose work I have actually seen, and that was Concussion's Will Smith in his role as Dr. Bennet Omalu, the real-life Nigerian forensic pathologist who worked as a coroner in Pittsburgh, and who discovered the scandal of the prevalence of CTE - Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy - in former professional football players. Smith's performance of the Nigerian doctor was absolutely riveting. I simply cannot understand how the Academy failed to put his name forward for a nomination: I can only surmise that either too many members of the Academy were afraid of offending the National Football League, or that the overwhelmingly white Academy is still, in 2016, blinded by prejudice.

Have we traveled no further than this since the death of Dr. Martin Luther King? Do we still allow the biggest bullies on the block to have all the power? One scene in particular that stirred me was the confrontation of Dr. Omalu with one of the NFL-sponsored doctors who had conducted "tests" to see if the type of head injuries typical in football could have long-term deleterious effects on the brain. Being in the pocket of the NFL as this doctor was, he concluded that there was no reason to worry about brain injuries from football. Omalu knew that this was a lie; he did not know that he was supposed to cower before the might of the NFL. He challenges this doctor:

"If you continue to deny my work, the world will deny my work. But men—your men—continue to die, their families left in ruins...Tell the truth!...Tell the truth!"

Alas, the lack of courage to *tell the truth* is all-too prevalent in public (and especially political!) discourse. The Torah commands us, however, *Do not stand idly by the blood of your neighbor* (Lev. 19:16). Dr. King and Dr. Omalu were both men of tremendous faith, courage, and integrity. I believe that Will Smith deserves an Oscar for his brilliant depiction of Omalu's courage to always tell the truth. So whether you watch the Oscars or not, I urge you to see *Concussion*, which, as a story of a man who faithfully spoke out on behalf of the "blood of his neighbor" is a very "Jewish" movie!

We are working on some interesting speakers for upcoming Sunday breakfasts, but we have decided to wait until spring so that the difficulties that can arise in winter are not an issue. More news to follow.




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### SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT THE JEWISH MOVIES: "THE GREAT DICTATOR"

## \*\*Note "Winter time" of 2 pm

The Great Dictator is a 1940 American political satire comedy-drama film written, directed, produced, scored by and starring Charlie Chaplin. It was Chaplin's first true sound film. Chaplin's film advanced a stirring, controversial condemnation of Adolf Hitler, Benito Mussolini, fascism, antisemitism, and the Nazis. At the time of its first release, the United States was still formally at peace with Germany. Chaplin plays both leading roles: a ruthless fascist dictator, and a persecuted Jewish barber. In addition to being Chaplin's most commercially successful film, modern critics have praised it as a historically significant film and an important work of satire. The Great Dictator was nominated for five Academy Awards - Outstanding Production, Best Actor, Best Writing (Original Screenplay), Best Supporting Actor for Jack Oakie, and Best Music (Original Score).
