A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

This past Friday evening we celebrated Simchat Torah, the last holiday of the Fall holiday season that begins with Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year, continues with the holiest and most solemn day of the year, Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, and concludes with Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah. Each day has its unique rituals and flavor.

Simchat Torah literally means the “Rejoicing over the Torah” and celebrates the conclusion of our reading the entire Torah during the course of the year. One of the customs of Simchat Torah is to take the Torah scrolls out of the ark and march and dance them around the sanctuary accompanied by *simchadik* (joyous) songs. I still remember many Simchat Torah celebrations throughout my life. I can recall those in Sunnyside, Queens when they gave the little kids, (I was one of them), paper flags and Macintosh apples and we paraded behind the scrolls in the sanctuary. Ten years later, as a teenager, I remember the Yeshiva students in our synagogue, Young Israel of Sunnyside (Queens), walking to Williamsburg, Brooklyn after our services were over, in order to celebrate with the Chassidim there. Unfortunately, I knew my parents wouldn’t let me go and I missed out on it.

In college, the celebrations at Hillel were very exciting with hours of fervent dancing and singing. One of the reasons I wanted to go to the University of Pennsylvania was its active Hillel – and it proved to be a crucial part of my college education. Among many other things, it gave me a sense of what Simchat Torah could be.

During my junior year of college in Jerusalem, my friends and I went down to Meah Shearim, the Chassidic section of the city, because we knew the celebration would probably be most intense there. Unfortunately that was only true for the males among us. The women in Meah Shearim were much less fervent celebrators and were relegated to the balconies.

When I eventually moved back to New York City and frequented Conservative synagogues, on Simchat Torah I would go to places where the police would cordon off some streets to traffic so that hundreds of people could dance with the Torah scrolls under the night skies of the Upper West Side of Manhattan.

In the 1990’s, B’nai Jeshurun began to be an extremely popular Synagogue in that same neighborhood. An average Friday night service would attract about 1,000 people. The service was very musical on any given week, so that by the time it reached Simchat Torah, the wide avenue outside the building was crowded with people danc-

ing and singing. The celebration probably went on until about midnight. It took hours to do the seven traditional *Hakafot*, the seven rounds of dancing with the Torah. I remember one time while taking a short break from the dancing I was talking to a writer acquaintance named Nessa Rapoport who said one sentence I’ve never forgotten. Nessa said she was so glad she lived in Manhattan so that her children could experience this kind of Simchat Torah.

Part of why I never forgot what Nessa said was that I am convinced that many of the experiences that move us most deeply are not usually intellectual or cerebral, but rather moments or events that we experience with our entire being, experiences that envelop us – our senses, our bodies, our hearts, **and** our minds. They speak to us on many levels both conscious and unconscious. And when we are transported by an experience, hopefully our minds are also addressed and are not checked outside the door, so to speak.

When we experience something viscerally (an English translation of “in our *kishkes*”) it has a unique impact. That’s why I’m so glad that some of our Hebrew school students attended our Simchat Torah celebration. Their participating in our singing and dancing with the Torah is an essential complement to their learning how to read Hebrew. Their standing up on the bimah as part of a group *aliyah* (reciting the Torah blessings) is something I hope they will remember – I still recall when I was a young kid crowded together with other young kids under a large *Tallit* (*Tallis*) when the Torah blessings were recited on Simchat Torah. There was a feeling of excitement, mystery, and the partaking of something very special about it.

In the late 1960’s and early 70’s an Eastern religious movement called “Krishna Consciousness” was quite popular. I like to think of the kind of experiences I’m advocating as “Kishke Consciousness.” I’m not referring to stuffed derma, but rather to experiences that deeply touch and move us. Hopefully that quality of experience leads us to study more about our Tradition which, in turn, enhances our practice of it. Significantly, another practice on Simchat Torah is to not only conclude the reading of the entire scroll, but to immediately begin it anew – as an expression of our love of Torah.

All of these experiences have stayed with me, as I’m sure yours have stayed with you. Realistically I recognize that even if the longed-for commuter railroad ever reaches Fall River, we will never have a Jewish demographic comparable to New York City or Jerusalem, but we do have the genuine joy and privilege of sharing Simchat Torah as a committed, engaged, warm and caring community. May we share many more such celebrations in good health.

**Message from the Board of Directors
given by Ken Littman during the
Yom Kippur service:**

We would like to wish all of you a happy, healthy and peaceful new year. L'shanah Tovah. On behalf of the board of directors of Temple Beth El, we are issuing a challenge to all of you who are part of our Temple family. I am sure that you are aware of the current status of our Jewish community in Fall River; that over the years, the number of Jewish people in the area, along with our congregation, has greatly diminished in size. During the 1960's and 1970's the Temple was home to hundreds of families with memberships, and a Hebrew school containing about 30-35 students in each grade. High holiday services took place in both the Sanctuary and the Ziskind Auditorium.

Today, we are a congregation of about 185 members, 185 members supporting a budget of approximately \$310,000 per year. One doesn't need to be a financial wizard to see that the dues structure does not support the cost of maintaining our Temple. We are all aware of what we pay in dues, a modest amount compared to other congregations. Given the costs involved in operating the Temple, the dues charge should be much higher. But we are not suggesting that the dues be raised at this

time. While the dues structure will not change for the present, something *has* changed at the Temple. There is a new spirit, a sense of determination to maintain our beautiful synagogue and expand membership and activities. That has been spurred by the dynamism and hard work of Rabbi Elber and Cantor Brown, along with the leadership of our president, Steve Silverman. Their enthusiasm and hard work are leading to a reversal of the pessimism of the past. For the first time in many years, a Hebrew School is up and running, preparing students for their bar and bat mitzvahs. This is but one of the positive things happening at the Temple. Libby Cohen and Norm Bolski, during Rosh Hashanah services last month, outlined the many programs and events that have taken place over the past year.

This gives us reason for hope in the future of our Temple. To enable us to stay on this positive path, we are asking you to pause and reflect during this high holiday season on the importance of supporting the revival of our Temple and our Jewish community. We are asking for your help, not only financially, but by your active participation in the life of the Temple.
