A message from our Spiritual Leader,
Cantor Shoshana Brown

U'fros Aleinu Sukkat Shlomekha*

This morning at the weekday minyan (I write this on the Monday before Rosh haShanah), we read these words from Psalm 27:

*One thing I ask of Adonai—for this I yearn:
To dwell in the House of Adonai all the days of my life—
To behold God's beauty, to pray in God's sanctuary.*

And I could not help but reflect on them: “Are these words true for me?” If so, why is that the rabbi and I usually *take turns* attending the weekday minyan? Last year it was because one of us had to take Lev to school, and his primary-school's start-time conflicted with our minyan-time. But now Lev is in middle school, and there is plenty of time between his drop-off time of 7:15 and the minyan start-time of 8:00 for me to come on both Mondays and Thursdays. But what I have found instead is that after I drop him off at 7:15, I have a whole marvelous early morning to walk down by the Taunton River-front, and then come home and say my prayers; or, on some mornings, I take my *tallit* and *tefillin* and *siddur* with me and *daven* (pray) in a wildlife refuge in Tiverton, then walk along the Sakonnet, visiting a farmstand for local produce before heading back to Fall River. Sometimes I linger at the farmstand's café and work on a sermon or bulletin article if I have one coming due. We have had such lovely end-of-the-summer weather, and we have so many beautiful spots here on the South Coast!

So perhaps those words are not true for me: like many people, I find the natural “God-connectivity” available walking along a river, down a country road, or under a forest canopy to be a bit stronger than the signal I get in a synagogue sanctuary—at least in the immediate sense. And is this gorgeous Earth, especially in her more unspoiled places, not also “the *House of Adonai*,” God's “*sanctuary*”? The Hebrew of that last word, *heikhal*, actually means “temple,” or perhaps “palace”: indeed this gorgeous planet is more magnificent than any palace or temple built by human hands.

Yesterday was the autumn equinox and this year the date of a historical event as more than half a million people around the globe took part in 2,000 demonstrations and rallies in over 150 countries, demanding that world leaders take *significant action* to curb the rate of climate-affecting pollution that the world's industrialized nations relentlessly pour into Earth's atmosphere, ground, and waters. We are desecrating our temple, *God's temple*—and although, so far, its beauty still shines through, it is a sacrilege of the highest order.

Immediately following the above-quoted words in Psalm 27 are these (my own translation):

*But God will hide me in His **sukkah** on the day of evil,
Giving me cover in the secret places of His tent,
setting me up high on a rock...*

Do you remember what a **sukkah** is? A flimsy, temporary “house” with sometimes only 3 walls, the roof made out of branches or cornstalks, with enough space between them to see the moon and the stars, or the blue sky. Is *this* what the Psalmist meant? How can we be *hidden*, kept *safe from evil* in such a fragile structure?

The Jewish holiday of **Sukkot** comes now, as a powerful reminder: that just as our Earth is fragile, vulnerable to all of our many human depredations, so our personal and collective relationships with God and the Jewish people (and indeed with all of humanity and all of creation) are fragile, vulnerable to the vicissitudes of our lives. We cannot be protected from harm by brick and steel, nor by thick stone walls. We are best protected when we are best connected—and that means when we can see *both* the light of the sky through our “shrine's” branches, *and* when we can see God in the face of our neighbor.

When I take a step back and look at the larger picture, I realize that, after all, my “connectivity” to God is strong indeed in our small chapel: it is the connection to God through *people* and *community*. How is *your* community-connection these days? Come join us during Sukkot, for our celebration of *Simchat Torah* (with dinner), on a Monday or Thursday morning (with a hot breakfast), on Friday nights or on Shabbat mornings (with Shabbat lunch). It is a juggling act—keeping all the “balls” of service to God, our Neighbor, and our Planet in the air without dropping one—but this “act” can also make our lives deeply meaningful.

As we sing on Friday nights: *U'fros aleinu sukkat shlomekha...* May God spread a *sukkah* of peace over all in this community, over all Israel, and over—to borrow a phrase from the Episcopal *Book of Common Prayer*—“this fragile Earth, our island home.”

Here are some of the things that have been happening in the Temple Beth El Community since the Rabbi and Cantor joined our community in July of 2013:

A "**Hannukat ha Bayit**" (house dedication) gathering as the cantor and rabbi affixed mezzuzot to their new home on Walnut St.

Weekly adult education by the rabbi and cantor covering a wide array of topics.

Weekly adult Hebrew class with the rabbi.

The cantor and Marie have worked together to completely revamp **our website**, which is now a tremendous resource.

Re-opening of the TBE Hebrew School, with 2 pre-bnei mitzvah and 5 younger children. We celebrated Madison Theis' bat mitzvah this past June, and we will celebrate Ian Grajales' bar mitzvah this coming October 11th.

The cantor began a **TBE Youth Group**: so far they have gone bowling and to a planetarium; the cantor has many plans for them this coming year, including a tour of "Jewish Providence" and a whale-watching trip!

Both last year and this year a group of 20-some people gathered at the rabbi's and cantor's home on Walnut Street for a **Selichot service**.

Spirited Simchat Torah service here in the sanctuary with a congregational dinner to follow.

A gala **Installation for the Cantor and Rabbi** with wonderful clergy and musical guests.

The cantor hosted all of the **Community Day Care kids in our TBE sukkah** last year for songs and story-telling; she also visited their classrooms with her guitar, singing Hannukah, Christmas, and other seasonal songs with them.

Homelessness Education Shabbat

Establishment of a **Social Action Committee** focusing on the problem of homeless families in the Fall River/Somerset area; in connection with this, a winter clothing drive and collection of canned goods for families living in area motels designated for homeless families.

A **Hannukah party** brought 50 people together to eat latkes, sing and light candles at the rabbi's and cantor's home on Walnut Street.

The cantor has instituted twice a month **early Kabbalat Shabbat services at the FRJ Home**; the residents look forward to her visits.

The rabbi and cantor have both become regular contributors to the Fall River **Herald News** clergy column.

Tu biShevat Seder attended by both TBE and Adas Israel.

Lecture and Slide presentation on **Sahar Hassamain synagogue** at Porto Del Gado, Azores.

The cantor began a "**Psalms Reflections**" project which those who are on our email list receive, including her written reflections on psalms and youtube links to her musical renditions of the featured psalm.

We had a fantastic **Purim celebration** this past year: with a service, Megillah reading and Seudah, followed by the religious school kids' fabulous **Purim Shpiel**, "The Revenge of Shushan!"

We had a wonderful **Community 2nd Night Seder** here on Passover, with about 50 attendees.

Rabbi Elber, together with our member, Ada Schneider, held a **joint poetry reading** at the Somerset Library entitled "Taking Turns."

For **Yom haShoah**, Holocaust Remembrance Day, the cantor brought a **children's choir from our religious school** to sing her composition "The Butterfly" at the Yom Ha Shoah commemoration at Tiferet Israel in New Bedford.

This past spring we began our once a month "late" Kabbalat Shabbat services on the 1st Friday of each month (at 6:30 instead of 5:30). We call it "**Friday Night Live**," and it features new tunes and sometimes guest musicians.

On the Friday closest to Yom Ha Atzma'ut held a "**Tribute to Israel**" service featuring special readings, songs and Israeli food and wine. This will be an annual event.

On the night of Shavuot the rabbi and cantor held a "**Tikkun Leil Shavuot**," a late-night Torah study session at their home; about 25 people squeezed around their dining room table for study and desserts.

In June the **TBE religious school students co-led a Friday night service** and then continued their celebration of Shabbat at dinner at the cantor's and rabbi's home.

In August the rabbi and cantor held a **Tisha b'Av service** at their home featuring chanting from the book of Lamentations.

Finally, the rabbi and cantor have reached out to their Christian colleagues here in Fall River and have instituted a **monthly interfaith clergy study group** that meets here at Temple Beth El. We have had one of the priests from Church of the Holy Spirit on Rock Street as a guest preacher (last November), and Cantor Brown reciprocated by preaching there on a Sunday during Advent (last December).

We are delighted to have gained 12 new members to our TBE family during the past year: thanks to the Rabbi and Cantor for helping to make Congregation Beth El grow and flourish!
