A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

The Times We are Living Through

In a recent opinion essay in the *Pittsburgh Jewish Chronicle* by Yossi Klein Halevi (author of two books we have read together in our TBE adult ed class, *At the Entrance to the Garden of Eden*; and *Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor*), Yossi asks four questions about the current campus protests against Israel's prosecuting of the war against Hamas:

How has it come to this? How is it possible that Israel, rather than Islamism, would become the villain on liberal campuses? That thousands of students would be chanting "from the river to the sea" even as that Hamas massacre revealed that slogan's genocidal implications? That the most passionate outbreak of student activism since the 1960s would be devoted to delegitimizing the Jewish people's story of triumph over annihilation?

We are living through a historical time of great complexity. Probably *all* eras share this complexity, but our era is unique in that too many of us (especially college-age kids, I am told) get our "news" via forms of social media that are not at all conducive to complexity. These young people see shocking images of victims of the war in Gaza; short video clips on platforms like Tik-Tok; shared posts on Facebook or re-tweeted messages on X, and they feel pressure to "like" or share these posts — without bothering to research whether these messages tell the whole story.

That there should be great ignorance amongst American college kids about the history of the State of Israel, how it came to be, how many wars it has had to fight against its Arab neighbors – and about how many times the Palestinians have rejected the opportunity to make peace with Israel and begin the project of building up a peaceful nation of their own alongside the Jewish state (including in 1947) – this is not at all surprising. Not all of us, at whatever age, are fully up to par when it comes to world history. (How many of us understand why Haiti, for example, is going through such a brutal, chaotic period of lawlessness?) But if you don't know much about the history of a country or a conflict, shouldn't you take on the responsibility of educating yourself about it before you start beating drums and yelling slogans?

Yet this responsibility requires time, and sustained attention – something that young people's habituation to getting their information in electronic formats has probably eroded. Modern technology encourages skimming, instant gratification, and rapid context-switching; also, sharing ideas in short sloganized bites: "Free Palestine"; "Defund the Police," etc. Do all the sharers of such slogans mean the same thing when they use these phrases? *Do they even really know what they mean* when they share these phrases?

It is a difficult time to be a young person growing up. For some of us not-so-young Jews, on the other hand, we, rather than having a short span of attention when it comes to Israel, have, since October 7, hardly been able to think about anything else. I always scour the newspaper first thing in the morning for any reporting on Israel, and I have come to be an avid listener to three different podcasts that are either completely or frequently devoted to this topic.

From what I can glean from the many sources where I get my Israel-news, the Jewish State seems to be either at the precipice of a major breakthrough of peace and cooperation with many of the Sunni Arab states in the Middle East (which could usher in a "golden age" for Israel and Palestine) – or on the verge of its greatest existential crisis (since it is not only Hamas, but Hezbollah, Iran and the Houthis who are intent on Israel's demise). What will the future hold for Israel? What will become of the mental and emotional health of our own nation's young adult generation who are constantly bombarded with superficial hits of "news" and other electronic distractions that discourage them from delving into things deeply, from sifting through complex issues carefully?

Two things that traditional Judaism offers us to keep our brains healthy and our humanity intact are the prioritizing of *community* and the observance of *Shabbat*. As I write these words, we are preparing for the first in-person "Celebrate Israel" Shabbat that we have been able to hold since before the COVID pandemic. This service is modeled on a seder, done around a communal table, with kiddush and challah, some symbolic Israeli foods, songs and readings.

There is so much wisdom in our Jewish "folkways" (as Reconstructionist founder Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan called our Jewish rituals and customs). Just as the Jewish State serves as a refuge for Jews who might be in danger around the world, so Shabbat offers us a refuge from a technology-addicted world that scatters our attention and serves too often to keep us in a state of anxiety, feeling isolated.

But of course it is up to each individual Jew to choose whether to avail him/herself of this refuge, just as it is up to each of us whether to stay connected to the Jewish community, or to care deeply about the State of Israel, as well as about the world at large.

This summer we will be showing a treasure-trove of Israeli films in our "Sunday Afternoon at the Jewish Movies" series. And this month at our *Tikkun Leil Shavuot* late night text-study we will be studying an important contemporary Israeli thinker's writings on Israel and Zionism. I hope you will avail yourselves of some of these offerings, keeping yourself connected to community, to Shabbat, and to Israel.

Wishing you all a happy and healthy summer, and a *Chag Shavuot Sameach*,

SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT THE JEWISH MOVIES SUMMER FEATURES!

June 9: *The Goal*: (Comedy) After falling for a dangerous mobster's girlfriend (played by Gal Gadot), a famous Israeli athlete (played by Orshri Cohen) puts in motion a wild and comical ruse that will open his eyes to a reality to which stardom had previously blinded him. 2019; 1 hour and 45 minutes.

July 21: *The Other Story:* Strong female protagonists have been the mainstay of many Avi Nesher films. In *The Other Story*, two rebellious young women - one fleeing the chaos of secular hedonism for the disciplined comforts of faith; the other desperate to transcend her oppressive religious upbringing for sexual and spiritual freedom - cross paths unexpectedly in Jerusalem, to startling consequences. 2019: 1 hour, 57 minutes.

August 11: *Time of Favor:* Tensions mount at the Temple Mount: In a West Bank settlement, Rabbi Meltzer has a grand design: he's building a movement to "take back" the Temple Mount." His settlement is getting its own military battalion to be commanded by Menachem, a disciple of the rabbi. He also wants his daughter, Michal, to marry Pini, the yeshiva's best scholar. Michal has no interest in Pini, but she is attracted to Menachem. Meanwhile, the army and Mossad are closely watching the rabbi's activities and Menachem's military training.

Yes, some of us have seen this film (released in 2000) before... but many of you have not – and it seemed particularly appropriate to see before Tisha b'Av. I hour and 42 minutes.
