A message from our Spiritual Leader,
 Rabbi Mark Elber
Spiritual Rhythms

Every season has its inner rhythm and its special times. Our tradition has built into it various times that are considered particularly sacred, times set aside from the normal daily activities characteristic of the work week. Shabbat is a weekly oasis in time (as Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel described it), twenty five hours meant to be set aside from our weekday occupations and preoccupations, from our concerns with “daily life,” time freed up for connecting with that which transcends our daily demands. Easier said than done.

I generally see spiritual disciplines as analagous to physical exercise. It’s the regular practice that keeps us “in shape.” When we’re developing a habit of physical exercise, we can’t expect to be in peak condition after one day of exercise. “Peak condition” is something we’re always striving towards – it’s our goal, the destination our path pursues. Even if we have developed a consistent habit of exercise, there are days we really don’t feel like doing it. But it is the regular practice of it that makes it easier to ease into each time and that makes the rewards consistently higher. Regular practice maintains us in better shape than doing so sporadically. We may not be at our peak level every time, but it keeps us at a higher level in general. Having a regular spiritual practice keeps our inner life more attuned on a daily basis to that which transcends the mundane. It keeps the pursuit of that end more present in our consciousness and, therefore, more a part of our daily lives. The more we occupy ourselves with something, the more it becomes a part of us. Whatever we keep in our consciousness becomes a part of us – the more we focus on it, the more it permeates who we are.

Some of our traditional prayers articulate ideals. For example, one of the first prayers in the morning is actually a reading from the third book of the Torah, (Leviticus 19:2, 14-18): “You shall be holy for I, The Eternal One your G!d, am holy. You shall not insult the deaf, nor put a stumbling block before the blind. You shall not render an unjust decision: Do not be partial to the poor nor show deference to the rich. Judge your neighbor fairly. Do not stand idly by the blood of your neighbor. You shall not hate your brother in your heart. Love your neighbor as yourself; I am the Eternal One.”

I often think how deceptively simple parts of the Torah can appear to be. The command not to insult the deaf has a number of elements implied in it. If we should not insult even someone who cannot hear the insult, how much more so should we not insult someone who can?! Plus this commandment cultivates a way of relating to people that refines our character. Saying these words in the morning sets these ideas in our awareness, even if only for the moments

that we consciously repeat them. Does that guarantee that we will live up to those ideals? Of course not. It does, however, remind us of our ideals and may resurface to guide us during the day.

Some prayers consist of cultivating gratitude for the blessings of our lives, helping us appreciate what we have so that we not take what we have for granted. The simple act of making a *brakha*, a blessing, over our food before we consume it, of pausing for a moment to be grateful that we have food to eat, also helps refine our inner selves. So often in our busy schedules we have to hurry through a meal. Pausing to reflect for a moment on what we’re eating and where it comes from can help us live in a different relationship with what we eat.

It’s far too easy to operate “on automatic,” to do things mechanically rather than consciously. That’s also the danger of the repetition of the same words and actions, i.e. they can be said or done mechanically rather than with depth of feeling and awareness. At the same time, when certain words become so familiar that they are there waiting for us, waiting to express what our spirits are longing to articulate, we can enter them deeply. The words of prayers are there to serve us, but they can only do so if we know them well. The better we know how to employ a tool, the more useful it is. Though the words of the *Siddur*, the prayer book, can seem like a script, they also carry the energy of thousands of years of Jewish history and of millions of people who have said those very words at those same times of the day, week, or year. Similarly, when we sound the shofar on Rosh Hashanah, we could hear it as a limited set of not very subtle tones or, in contrast, as deep visceral sounds that speak from a place more fundamental than the words that we can craft. We can also hear in it reverberations of the stories in which the shofar is mentioned in the Bible such as standing at Mt. Sinai, at the walls of Jericho, at the time of the Jubilee, etc. etc.

There are so many levels contained in our rituals because they have survived and evolved over thousands of years. What can seem like a very simple act or phrase often contains within it deep connections and interconnections both with the history of our people and our sacred literature. Do we have to believe every single word? Some words will speak deeply to us and other will not. But those words that may not resonate for us, may resonate for other members of the community, just like some melodies may appeal to some people and not to others. But when we say or sing them as a congregation we also build community connecting both with those of us sharing the same space and those from generations, centuries and even millennia ago.

As I mentioned at the beginning, each season has its special times. The special time of this season is the holiday of Shavuot. I look forward to seeing you during it, whether at our Tikkun or at services.

On April 9th, **Ada Schneider and Rabbi Mark** delighted a packed room at the Somerset Public Library with their **original poetry**. This is the second time that they have read together, and it just keeps getting better!

As I write this, I don't know whether the weather will have permitted our planned **April hike along the Cliff Walk in Newport** on April 26th, but I can urge you to get out your hiking boots for our **May hike – to the Mass Audubon Sanctuary, Allens Pond**, on the Dartmouth/Westport line. This hike will take place **on Thursday, May 24th**. As always, you are invited to the Thursday 8:00 morning service and breakfast beforehand – or you can simply show up and meet us in the vestry at 9:30 AM on that day. Caffeine and Conversations

On Tuesday, May 8th, Cantor Shoshana will lead the conversation in the monthly interfaith discussion-group meeting at the Fall River Public Library, "Caffeine and Conversations."

The event begins at 2 PM in the downstairs meeting room. Cantor Shoshana's topic on May 8th is "How to think about Death (and Life)".



This drama, largely based on the family history of director Barry Levinson, follows the immigrant Krichinsky clan as they settle in Baltimore during the early 20th century. While Sam Krichinsky establishes roots in the city and finds a wife, his ambitious son, Jules, who changes his last name to Kaye, tries to live the American Dream by opening an appliance store, revealing cultural and generational gaps. Avalon received Academy Award nominations for Best Screenplay Written Directly for the Screen, Best Music, Original Score, Best Cinematography, and Best Costume Design. Levinson's script won the Writers Guild of America Award for Best Original Screenplay. It was also nominated for a Golden Globe for Best Picture.






CEMETERY HEADSTONE CLEANING

It's that time again -- our cemetery landscaper, Tommy Fillipovich, has once again offered to pressure-wash the headstones and foot markers using a biodegradable cleanser that won't damage the stones or the surrounding grass. The results are impressive, with the stones looking amazingly like new.

As setting up the equipment is time-consuming, Tommy has offered to do all of the pressure-washing in one day for a discounted price. Headstones will be cleaned for \$60 each, foot markers for \$15 each. In order to take advantage of the discount, we must receive your check no later than May 18th. Those stones that have been paid for will be clean and shiny in time for Memorial Day weekend. For those who miss the deadline, the cost for cleaning a headstone will be \$100, a foot marker will be \$25, and they will be cleaned at our landscaper's convenience. We plan to offer the discount day each May.
