A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

I can still remember the very tense days leading up to the Six Day War, listening to the radio, worrying about what would happen with the Egyptian blockade of the Straits of Tiran preventing Israeli shipping and trade through the Red Sea, while Egypt and Syria were positioning huge armies on their borders with Israel. At first, when the war began, the news included Arab claims of great victories during the first days of the war, and then, suddenly, the war was over, and Israel had miraculously and dramatically won.

I remember during my second trip to Israel a year later, in the summer of 1968, the first time I went to the Kotel, the outer Western Wall of the Beit HaMikdash (the ancient Temple in Jerusalem). Like so many other people, I put a note in between the huge stones of the wall. I truly fell in love with Israel during that trip. On our tour of the Golan there was an American college student with his parents on our bus spending his junior year at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. I decided then and there that that's what I wanted to do. I had a lot of family in Israel including my father's older sister and younger brother, two of his aunts and two of his uncles, my mother's closest living relative (her oldest brother's son) and numerous cousins. When I arrived very late at night on the flight from JFK with many other students on the Oneyear Overseas Program, my aunt and uncle from Haifa were waiting at the airport to see me for literally a minute before returning to Haifa. We students quickly got on a bus to the Negev to study Hebrew for hours every day at Sde Boker before the academic year started. We lived at the college of Sde Boker which was two kilometers away from Kibbutz Sde Boker where Ben Gurion lived. He came to speak with us (or as he said, to listen to us) on our first Shabbat there.

Those were much simpler times. At least they seemed to be. Maybe that was true for certain issues, but less true for others. There was certainly a lot of turmoil over the Vietnam War back in those late 1960s early 1970s days. Israel, however, back then was not a very polarizing issue, especially not in the Jewish world. After the Six Day War it seemed that Israel's existence became increasingly central in Jewish circles. What a contrast with today. As is obvious to anyone, we are living in extremely polarized times. To a large degree the art of listening respectfully to those with whom we disagree is becoming increasingly rare. How different from Jewish tradition. The Talmud, traditionally referred to as the "Oral Torah" (Torah sheh'b'al'peh), is largely constructed upon the scaffolding of discussions and disagreements, the vast majority of which are not resolved. Instead, we're often left with a majority opinion and a minority opinion. Even though Jewish law and custom was determined by the majority opinion, the minority opinion was included in the Talmud out of respect for the integrity and insights of the minority.

Today Jewish clergy are left in a very difficult bind. They want to address, particularly on the High Holidays, issues that are of extreme importance, including Israel and the war in Gaza. At the same time, they are afraid of the polarized opinions in the congregation. No one wants to alienate congregants. I listened to the beginning of a Rosh Hashanah sermon by one of the most influential rabbis in the United States, Rabbi Angela Buchdahl who has been the rabbi of Central Synagogue (one of the biggest synagogues in Manhattan) for twenty years. I met her in 2019 at a Friday evening Shabbat service in Tel Aviv held weekly outdoors overlooking the Mediterranean Sea where she had brought 150 of her congregants on their tour of Israel. She opened her Rosh Hashanah sermon saying that she "has never been so afraid to talk about Israel." Though she is a deep supporter of Israel and of Israel's right to defend itself, and lays the responsibility for this current war squarely on Hamas, she also feels a lot of pain for the suffering of innocent Gazans while acknowledging how over and over again Hamas has cynically put its citizens in harm's way, even blocking civilians from leaving areas that Israel has forewarned would be bombed.

In today's climate of deep divisions, some Jews cannot acknowledge the suffering of innocent Palestinians, while other Jews can no longer acknowledge the suffering of Israelis because they are so outraged by the images of the war they see almost daily. The latter response is more prevalent among the younger generation of college students who tend to no longer feel the attachment and centrality of Israel to Jewish life as did their parents or grandparents. Of course, there are still young Jews who love Israel and many of them have experienced antisemitism, or antisemitism masquerading as "anti-Zionism" on college campuses, but that's a topic too big for this column.

Generations naturally differ in their responses to things for many reasons. The Zionist pioneers of the early 1900s differed from those who came after the state was founded, who are different from young Israelis today, despite the common feature of loving their country. It is important to acknowledge that one can both love one's country and be critical of its government's policies. Clearly hundreds of thousands of Israelis who demonstrate weekly against the way Netanyahu is conducting the war believe that. When that ceases to be tolerated, democracy is in danger. For those of us who feel strongly that Israel should be both a Jewish and a democratic state, that is vital. As I'm sure you all know, unlike in the United States, virtually every Israeli (with the exception of the ultra-Orthodox) serves in the army and sees its government's policies as a matter of life and death both for themselves and for their country.

Happy 5786!

A **huge** *todah rabbah* (thank you) to all who helped to make our final High Holy Days in our High Street location beautiful and meaningful: to all who participated with us in person or online; to all who took an aliyah; read a poem on the bimah; chanted Torah or a haftarah; contributed to the flower fund; blew the shofar; served as an usher; helped with the opening and closing of the ark; organized and prepared the break-the-fast at the end of Yom Kippur...you see, it truly "takes a village" to keep a synagogue community alive and functioning.


But we are not done with the holidays yet! Rabbi Mark and I hope to see some of you during *Sukkot*, when we will share a modest bite and fellowship with Kiddush in the temple's sukkah after morning services on the first two days of Sukkot (10/7 and 10/8), as well as on the intermediate Shabbat (10/11).

Technically, Sukkot ends on Hoshanah Rabbah (this year on Monday 10/13), when we will "beat our willows" (part of the "4 species" bundle that we wave during Sukkot), and the next day, the holiday of Shemini Atzeret (literally the "8th day of assembly"), is the day when we will recite Yizkor (the morning of 10/14). That night we will hold an abbreviated Erev Simchat Torah service (beginning at 5:30), but we will be saving our fuller Simchat Torah celebration for the next morning (Wed., 10/15) — because that morning is our October Make a Minyan, and our freilikh service (wear your dancing shoes!) will be followed by a celebratory luncheon.

This luncheon will likely be *the last full meal ever* served in our historic building, so I hope that as many of you as possible can make it!

As of now, the last two scheduled Shabbat services in our High St. location will be the Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service on 10/31 and the Shabbat morning service on 11/1.

I wish I could alert you now to early November events in our upcoming space in the Unitarian Church at 309 North Main St., but there have been so many things that we have had to juggle, what with the High Holy Days and Sukkot/ Simchat Torah coming right before our time to vacate the High St. building – it has just been too overwhelming! So please – keep on the lookout for emails from the Temple office which will inform you of any special events marking our inauguration of the new space. (We want to have a joyful celebration of our move and a way to "dedicate" our new home – but we have yet to make firm plans!)



SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT THE JEWISH MOVIES

October 26, 2 PM: The World Will Tremble: Written and directed by Academy Award-nominee Lior Geller, The World Will Tremble tells the powerful true story of Michał Podchlebnik and Solomon Weiner, two prisoners who became the first to escape the Chełmno extermination camp on January 19, 1942, and courageously bear witness to the horrors perpetrated by the German regime. Of the more than 320,000 Jews sent to Chełmno, only four survived—two of them were Weiner and Podchlebnik, who risked everything to expose the truth. Located near Łódź, Chełmno was one of six extermination camps established solely for mass murder during WWII.

Geller spent over a decade meticulously researching this film, collaborating with historians, Jerusalem's Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial center, and the families of these brave men to create an authentic and moving retelling of their remarkable escape.

This is the first feature film adaptation of Michał and Solomon's untold story, a testament to their incredible courage in the face of unimaginable odds. 2025; 1 hour 48 minutes

On behalf of the Board, I would like to invite you to attend the Ceremonial Burial of our holy items at the TBE Cemetery in Fall River.

This is an event that does not occur often. It is a part of your TBE heritage. Perhaps you used some of the prayer books that are being buried. Most of all, it is a solemn occasion, and the TBE spirit would be warmed by having many TBE Family and Friends attend the burial.

Here are some additional details:

- Duration: 30-45 minutes.
- There will be a tent and chairs, similar to any funeral.
- We will load boxes of books etc. into the grave (Rabbi Mark, Cantor Shoshana, Carleen, Rick, Leonard, and Tommv. our landscaper).
- Rabbi Mark & Cantor Shoshana will lead the service.
- All attendees are invited to help shovel earth to bury the items. (Tommy will use a machine to finish the job after the ceremony)
- If anyone would like a walking tour of the cemetery we can do that after the service.
- There will be a handwashing station as you exit the cemetery.

A few reasons why we have items to bury.

- Prayer books that are out of date, and we have more modern versions which we use.
- Prayer/Religious books, and some old Torah covers that were in areas having mold, mildew, water damage, etc.
- As we cleaned out our library, we had books that no one wanted, but which had the name of G-d written in Hebrew, or similar Hebrew scripture in them and thus require ritual burial.
- All items selected were reviewed and approved by Rabbi Mark.

We hope to see you at this special service.

THE ORIGINAL BUYER, HYDE DEVELOPMENT, HAS BACKED OUT OF THE SALE AND IS NO LONGER INTERESTED.

THEREFORE, WE HAVE SIGNED AN AGREEMENT TO PUT THE HIGH STREET SITE UP FOR AUCTION, WHICH IS SCHEDULED FOR NOVEMBER 6, 2025, WITH THE FINAL CLOSING IN MID-DECEMBER 2025

The Auction company/agent is the same as we were using for the Hyde Development sale.

- There will be announcements of the auction through various electronic communication channels, e.g. to developers, real estate investors, etc.
- Signs will be put up at High Street in October announcing the auction.
- Our Attorney, Mike Levinson Esq, of Brainsky/ Levinson, LLC, has participated in all appropriate discussions and reviewed all contracts.

Hyde Development has not shared much information as to why they have withdrawn. But they have fully assured us it has nothing to do with TBE, nor our agreement terms, nor our agent. It had nothing to do with the price. They noted that their reasons were all related to other projects they had on-going.

People Incorporated Preschool, which was renting the school section of TBE, moved to their new building in September. They are paying rent through Oct 31st, which is the end of their lease.

Shortly after the November 6th auction we will send announcements to the membership on the outcome.

Shalom TBE Friends and Family,

As noted in a few articles, and sermons, we are moving from our High Street Building to a new home three blocks away.

We will be sharing a building with the Unitarian Society of Fall River, located at:

We will be holding all services and classes at this new location.

Marie's office will also be located there.

This will also be the new address for all TBE correspondence, including Cemetery Correspondence.

The building has a bright and airy chapel with a high ceiling and lots of glass panels, with views of the sky and surrounding grounds.

It also has a Function Room which we will be using for Kiddushes, Sunday Movies, and any other social events.

There are absolutely no Christian symbols anywhere in or on the building. It is a very generic place of worship. The leaders have been exceptionally welcoming. One time we noticed something that "might" be construed as iconography. They immediately took it down. They were excited about having an Aron Kodesh (Torah Ark) on the Bimah. Rick has arranged for a new Aron Kodesh. (We could not move the existing ones.) Cantor Shoshana and Rabbi Mark like it very much.

There is a fully functioning kitchen. We will have a separate refrigerator and storage cabinet. Libby Cohen, Carleen Makowski, and Elaine Weiss-Reback have been there several times, and are making preparations to facilitate meal functions. We just installed a new smooth entry walkway with a sturdy handrail. Everything is at ground level. There are NO STEPS anywhere. The restrooms are ADA friendly. There is a small parking lot.
